NOTE: A <u>Plan Entry Fee</u> of \$100.00 shall be paid in addition to the plan review fee at the time of submittal. <u>Revised Plan Fee</u> of \$75.00 plus \$100.00 submittal fee.

<u>Determine Area</u>: The area of a floor is the area bounded by the exterior surface of the building walls or the outside face of columns where there is no wall. Area includes all floor levels such as subbasements, basements, ground floors, mezzanines, balconies, lofts, all stories and all roofed areas including porches and garages, except for cantilevered canopies on the building wall. Use the roof area for free standing canopies.
